Composing a Conference

After the Minneapolis school district stopped funding the in-school conferences for the middle school Model United Nations (MUN) program, two dedicated teachers, with the help of volunteers from the University of Minnesota's MUN team, Cambridge High School's MUN team, and the MUN senior staff volunteered to help make the February 10th conference a truly memorable experience. To learn more about the teachers and this event, I interviewed the two teachers, Jason Jirsa and Taylor Harris, who later won the Norma Rowe MUN Teacher Award for their long-term commitment to and participation in MUN, hard work teaching and preparing students, as well as their high standards, enthusiasm, and creativity. I also interviewed Coleton Hanson, a senior staff member at MUN who's efforts made the event possible.

Jason Jirsa, a Social Studies teacher at Northeast Middle School, when asked how he decided to go into teaching, said that he has always loved working with kids and learning about history, social studies and geography. He started his teaching career at a U.S. Space Camp where he explained: *"everything was exciting."* Jirsa then transferred this student excitement for learning into the classroom where MUN became a geographical Space Mission. Jirsa added that *"Schools need more of this type of learning simulations and events to celebrate [students'] learning, [they need] something that feels real to them."*

Because he did not want to continue teaching without this program, Jirsa refused to take no for an answer when they stopped receiving funding. Instead, he searched for alternative ways to keep the competition afloat. Jirsa further shared that MUN has *"become part of the school culture, and I think it is really important for schools to have events to celebrate great learning throughout the year."* After the success of the recent event, Jirsa noticed an increase in the conversation around topics like *"What do we want our school to be?"* and *"What is going to be our thing?"* The success of the MUN competition has also inspired other teachers' interest in hosting events of their own.

Taylor Harris is also a Social Studies teacher at Northeast Middle School with a passion for both history and social studies. Harris recalled that he wanted to be a teacher for as long as he can remember in order to give back to students. When he was a kid, teachers helped him get things together when life was chaotic, and he wanted to continue paying it forward. His favorite part of Model UN is watching how nervous the students are all dressed up on the day of the

competition because they *“don’t realize how much they know until they start talking.”* Harris explained that they hold the students accountable to a high expectation level and talk up the competition emphasizing that it will be difficult and challenging, but throughout the process they let their students know *“you can do it, trust me.”* Because Northeast Middle School is in a high poverty Minneapolis district with a large population of minority students, Harris explained that students experience many struggles and extracurricular activities are often limited. MUN, therefore, plays a profound impact on many of the students’ lives.

Harris recalled the experience of one student who did not do anything until the night before the competition, to which he communicated *“if you do this you’re going to have to learn your position”* that night. The student decided that he needed to do this and stayed up all night handwriting a 5-page position paper on notebook paper which he turned in, and it ended up being one of the most complex resolutions Harris saw all year. *“Students who have experiences like this in school, who have something positive that they can be proud of that is purely academic is what makes [the program] worthwhile”* described Harris. To continue the MUN program, Harris plans to invite former students to come back and help with the program.

Coleton Hanson, a senior MUN staff member, assisted with the logistics and training at the February 10th competition. For each conference, many tasks must be completed to have a smooth and successful conference including sorting nametags and folders, making the most of what you already have, reserving space, delegating space, planning lunch, training volunteers, and much more, all of which they must complete several times a year. Hanson has been involved with MUN in some form since high school in 2005, he started volunteering a couple of years ago and then came back to help run the program. Hanson said that the February 10th conference was a lot of fun and for a lot of students, this was their first time wearing a suit. The small group Hanson worked with sorted out a refugee problem in Syria by suggesting the United States and Russia team up and send peacekeeping soldiers to Syria making it safe for refugees to return home. While this solution may not be feasible, the process gave the students a positive experience solving problems, practicing their research skills and was fun in the process. Hanson explained that they *“all do a lot of work with this program, everyone who participates whether they’re on the board, or whether they are a volunteer who’s just doing it for the first time. Everybody is essential to this program’s success, and it’s the reason I’m a part of United Nations Association of Minnesota (UNA-MN), it’s brought me back more than once, and I’m going to keep participating and helping out as long as I can.”*
